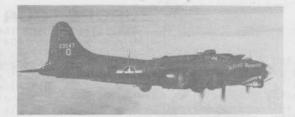

INFORMATION ON AUGUST EUROPEAN TOUR

The chance of a lifetime and at a price you cannot touch anywhere else in the travel world, is the way one of our tour participants described our planned trip to England, Belgium, Germany, Denmark and Sweden. And when you add the overnight sailing from Denmark to Harwich, England, we will have traveled by every form of transportation except the railroad.

There have been many changes in politics, finance, fuel costs and, yes, even personal freedom, since the last Newsletter. Gold and silver prices have escalated, descended and again escalated faster than the Piccadilly Circus escalators, but the effect on our pricing has so far been minimal. The £398 price is still firm and our mark-up at the \$2.20 per pound level is within $5 \rlap/$ per pound at the time of this writing and is going down. The six month forecasts on the cost of the dollar versus the pound still look very good.

Many of our regular travellers are booked and we still have space available for more. We are not bound to the the 180 persons and we are so far assured that more than ninety will be travelling. Your friends and relations, neighbors and faraway friends are also welcome to journey with us.

The date of final sign-up is 31 March 1980, for it is necessary to give our travel operators firm figures not later than 10 April 1980. At that time we will probably be able to estimate the increased costs for fuel adjustments. Everyone on the other side of the Big Pond is waiting for our arrival.

Many questions have been asked about air travel, which is the responsibility of the individual participants. If one is crowded for time, the lowest economy fare would be the APEX fare which allows up to six months for a return flight and must be booked at least twenty-one days in advance of the travel date. As an example, from Washington, D.C., the best forecast APEX fare without fuel adjustment costs is \$584.00 plus \$3.00 landing fees. If one has all the time necessary, perhaps the best bet would be Freddie Laker's flights out of New York, which are much cheaper, or you can rely on a stand-by fare with a regularly scheduled airline. However, in August you must allow plenty of time for getting a flight, especially in August. From Washington, the standby price being cited for August is \$426 plus \$3.00 landing tax (sans fuel adjustment). On this roundtrip ticket, one end is open, because your return trip is once again based on space available at the time you wish to return. If one would arrive in London a little early, the best bet for rooms would be with the small hotels like the Limetree House, which is located within one block of the Pan Am Building. Bed and breakfast do not cost an arm and a leg (maybe a foot), but the rooms are clean and comfortable and there are several good restaurants in the nearby area.

At the present moment, if you buy your ticket in advance, the price will remain constant. However, several of the larger airlines are now trying to have an adjustment factor cranked in because they believe large corporations, with known and constant overseas travel requirements, are booking their fares far in advance to save money on anticipated fare increases. You would do well to consult a known and trusted travel agent about your requirements. There are many changes in the winds on air travel costs - most of them on the "up" side.

Get out the November issue of the Newsletter and fill out the application form for the trip. Send it along with the \$100 per person deposit to John Ford. Insure the best time of your life with an early application. Don't forget that September will mark the 40th Anniversary of the Battle of Britain, and there will be many activities taking place in anticipation of that great celebration.

EUROPE TOUR ITINERARY

The itinerary and the tour price for the "Tour with your Matey in 1980" has been set at ± 398 English sterling. You will be kept up to date on all changes that may occur to this price - since all tour prices are contingent on fuel surcharges and money fluctuation. As previously stated, transportation to London is the responsibility of the individual taking part This enables you to take advantage in the Land Tour. of the most reasonable and convenient method of travel. The conversion figure for converting pounds to dollars was \$2.20 per pound. (Plus a \$4.40 service fee)

14 August 1980.

Arrival day in London. Tour participants will arrive throughout the morning at London's two main airports. Coaches will operate a special shuttle between the airports and your hotel. The afternoon is free to catch up on "jet lag" or to travel to London for an afternoon of gawking or sight-seeing. This evening we have a "Welcome Reception" - a chance to meet the persons you will be travelling with on the tour, to meet your WADE COURIER, to discuss the trip and to enjoy a Buffet 'spread" and have a drink, or two, or three ...

15 August 1980.

Morning leisurely drive north-easterly through the lovely Essex and Suffolk countryside, stopping at Colchester to stretch our legs and take a look at this ancient town - the oldest recorded town in the U.K. - before continuing on to the Ipswich area and our hotels. The afternoon is free for exploring your new environment and later we will have a "pub crawl", by coach, of some very interesting area Pubs. There you can sample some of the Tolly-Cobbold, Greene King and Adnams.

16 August 1980.

The morning is free for recovery and/or finding your way back to the hotel if you have been AWOL for the night. The local Constabulary is very friendly and always ready to assist. There may also be time for sightseeing or relaxing in the morning. In the early afternoon the coaches will take us to Great Ashfield and the old airfield where we can enter into the real spirit of a village shindig - a garden fete style gettogether organized with the villagers and members o Friends of the Eighth (FOTE). There will be tradi-tional activities such as "Bowling for a Pig", "Tro bola", etc., together with plenty of food, refreshments, movie and slide shows. Transportation around the old airfield will be provided and there will be music of the 1940's. You will be certified "ready Transportation around for sleep" by the time we return to the hotels.

17 August 1980.

This morning we will again visit Great Ashfield for a Memorial Service. The afternoon has been left free for independent activities such as visiting the home of friends or other villagers who may wish to entertain you in their homes. We may also be able to organize a trip around the neighboring villages to let wives and families see the area in which you were stationed during WW II.

In the evening an optional dress Dinner-Dance will be held at the Orwell Moat House in Felixstowe, Suffolk. Here you will have the opportunity to host and entertain guests of your choosing and to participate in one of the oldest traditional Dinner Dances in the Suffolk area. The Moat House is reknown for its fine cuisine, and its music makers are excellent. Men are expected to dress in suits with tie and shirt - sports suits are acceptable. Women may wear cocktail or evening dresses.

Remember, this is your chance to host a villager or member of FOTE, and to relax in a sophisticated atmosphere with friends and neighbours. It is guarenteed to be a night to remember - and a story that is worth telling when you return to the USA.

ITINERARY (Cont'd)

18 August and 19 August 1980.

Two great days and two great tours. Our first "day trip" takes us to Bury St. Edmunds and a stroll in the beautiful Abbey Gardens. Then on to Newmarket where the "orsey set" can look on with envy before continuing on to Cambridge. Time for lunch and sightseeing in the town before visiting the American Memorial Cemetery at Madingly, and the Air Museum at Duxford, which also houses an 8th Air Force Exhibit. There will be a late arrival back at the hotel.

The second "day trip" takes us northward along the coast, through the old fishing port of Lowestoft and on to the resort at Great Yarmouth. There will be time for lunch before we travel on to Norwich, a beautiful town in Norfolk. Here you have the opportunity to visit the Cathedral, tour the Castle, visit the Second Air Division's Living Memorial entry to the Norwich Library and shop in the Market. There are other places that can be explored before we again return to the hotel.

NOTE: Entry fees to the various museums and castles are not included, since many individuals may not wish to visit all or any of them.

20 August 1980.

Morning at leisure before we set off for another drive through old beauty spots of Suffolk and on to the lovely old town of Framlingham and nearby Parham Airfield. Here we'll visit the 390th Bomb Group Control Tower, which has been turned into a Museum by many of the pioneers of FOTE. There will be an evening Bar-B-Que around the Control tower in the late afternoon. (Can you read me Foxtrot Delta? Bear left 15° to runway 09 but keep clear of the broiling beefburgers and low lying charcoal piles.)

21 August 1980.

It's up, up and afloat this morning as we leave Felix-stowe for a five hour maritime experience aboard the modern Townsend-Thoresen ferry crossing the English Channel to Belgium. If the sea doesn't get to you, the famed "duty free" will, and we'll arrive into the port of Zeebrugge in the early afternoon. Our leisurely drive takes us due East across Belgium, into Germany and to the beautiful city of Cologne - arriving into our centrally located hotel in the late evening.

22 August 1980.

Morning at leisure. A "must" is a visit to the fabulous Gothic-spired Cathedral. Time for shopping or for a trip on the Rhine. Smaller boat than yesterday's. This afternoon we will drive on through Bremen to Hamburg - a lovely city that grew phoenix-like from the debris and ashes of destruction of the 2nd World War. Our hotel may be the elegant Reischof Hotel. We will go to the Zillertal Beer Hall in the evening - great fun-fun with an Oompah-Oompah Band.

23 August 1980.

This morning we will have a guided sightseeing tour of Hamburg before driving north to Puttgarten where we join the short ferry over to Rodbyhavn in Denmark. Another short drive takes us into central Copenhagen and our hotel. The evening is at leisure.

24 August 1980.

We start with a morning tour of the lovely city of Copenhagen. We'll see the Royal Palace, the "coppertopped" churches and even the Little Mermaid. We will end the tour (you can say that again!) at the Tuborg Brewery for a tour and a "sample"...or two...or three! The afternoon and evening are free for your own touring, exploring, eating, or what not.

25 August 1980.

A full day free in Copenhagen. Great shopping, or a visit to the Tivoli Gardens, a day just resting, or a small group get-together for a day of fun.

26 August 1980.

A long but very interesting day this will be. We'll visit Hamlet's Castle in Elsingor, then travel across to Sweden visiting the pretty towns of Malmo and Halsingborg before returning to Copenhagen late in the evening.

27 August 1980.

First stop on today's itinerary is a visit to Odense where we'll visit the Hans Christian Andersen Museum and have time for exploring before the short drive to the port of Esjberg, where we will join our overnight ferry for the trip back to England. Cabin accommodations on board plus good food and a hot "disco".

28 August 1980.

We'll arrive into Harwich in the mid-morning, and the coaches will soon have us transported into London and our hotel. The afternoon is free for shopping or strolling.

This evening we have a last night "get together" with a truly novel "Cockney Evening" with music and dancing. We'll start with traditional Cockney songs around the "piana" followed by a Cockney dinner featuring jellied eels or a prawn cocktail, fish n' chips, cockney boiled beef n' carrots, followed by a plum duff puddin' and coffee. A welcome shot of Scotch, or "mothers ruin" gin is included, as well as wine or beer throughout the meal. Everyone is guarenteed to enjoy this novel final "blast" to our holiday.

29 August 1980.

The coaches will transfer you to Gatwick or Heathrow Airport, where, amidst lots of tears, (the MADE Couriers are always like that - very emotional. They reload their tear ducts at Niagra Falls when when they bring English persons over to enjoy the swollen pound) you can wave fond farewells to warm beer and new-found friends - 'til the next time.

The tour price is \$880.00 per person, based on a \$2.20 per pound conversion rate. The price includes all coach travel as per itinerary, fourteen nights First Class hotel accommodations based on sharing twin-bedded rooms with private bathrooms, the Cocktail Buffet on the 14th, drinks and food at the air field on the 16th, the Dinner-Dance on the 17th, the last night Cockney Evening, hotel baggage handling charges, the guided tours of Hamburg and Copenhagen, the visit to Hans Christian Andersen Museum, ferry passage Felixstowe - Zeebrugge, Puttgarten - Rodbyhavn, Copenhagen - Malmo, Halsingborg - Harwich, cabin accommodations in twin-berth cabins on Esjberg-Harwich overnight sailing, Belgian Entry Fees, Ger-man and Danish Road Tolls, and the services of ex-perienced Drivers and Couriers who will accompany the tour throughout. CONTRACT BETWEEN LAND TOUR PARTICIPANT(S) AND 385TH BOMBARDMENT GROUP MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION

DAVID WADE LTD., Specialist Tour Operators, Felixstowe, Suffolk, England has, in an agreement with the 385th BGMA, agreed to provide the tour as specified in the November issue of the Association's Newsletter, for the sum of £ 398.00 sterling, with the proviso that OPEC fluctuations that may affect coach, ship and ferry prices, will be adjusted if that should become necessary. This quoted sum has been converted to dollars by the conversion factor of \$2.20 per pound sterling, plus a \$4.40 cost for administration (Paper, printing, mailing, etc). This converts to the sum of \$880.00 per person in U.S.A. currency.

For this sum each participant will be provided all coach travel as noted in the itinerary, fourteen (14) nights in 1st Class hotel accommodations with Continental breakfast, based on sharing twin-bedded rooms with private bathrooms, the Cocktail Buffet on the 14th, drinks and food at the airbase on the 16th, the Dinner Dance on the 17th, the last night "Cockney Evening", hotel baggage handling charges, the guided tour of Hamburg and Copenhagen, the visit to the Hans Christian Andersen Museum in Odense, ferry passage Felixstowe — Zeebrugge, Puttgarden — Rodbyhavn, Copenhagen — Malmo, Halsingborg — Harwich, cabin accomodation in twin-berth cabins on the Esjberg — Harwich sailing, Belgian Entry Fees, German and Danish Road Tolls and the services of experienced Drivers and Couriers who will accompany the tour throughout.

NOTES: The Yannello and Keeley crews suffered a mid-air collision while letting down near Great Ashfield after a mission to Reims-Champaigne. Windshield fogging was the primary cause. Both crews were on their 11th mission. Just nine days earlier, John Schley's aircraft collided with an aircraft from another group. Only John Adams, tail gunner on Yannello's crew, survived these crashes. Captain Hutchison and Lt. Pease aircraft also had a mid-air collision over Reedham Marsh, Norfolk, England. Hutchison's crew was on its 25th mission. The collision occurred during letdown after returning from a mission to Diepholz. 21 airmen were

lost in this accident. Phillip J. Vockerath was our only fatality of the "Black Thursday" mission to Schweinfurt, Germany, but the aircraft piloted by Bob Vandiver was so cadly shot up that it was diverted to a crash field for landing. Sgt. Sturdivant died when he was ordered to bail out. His parachute failed to open. His pilot and co-pilot were forced to ditch in the Channel.

The names of those members buried in the Cambridge American Memorial Cemetery were furnished to your

TSGT CLIFFORD J. PEEK JR. Combat Aerial Photographer 550th Bombardment Squadron DIED: 9 DECEMBER 1979 CAUSE: Heart Attack.

Mrs. Clifford J. (Gloria) Peek Jr., sent notification Of Sergeat Peek's death in early January. He was age 58

and death was sudden.

Cliff was best known for his exploits as a combat photographer to members of the 385th. Much of our pictorial history came from his skill. He was the supreme, dedicated artist who had entered the service as a comdedicated artist who had entered the service as a commercial photographer, and unselfishly helped the newly trained photographer sharpen his skill level. He had flown many missions, earning the Distinguished Flying Cross, Purple Heart and the Air Medal with clusters, when he was shot down over the Zuider Zee on 15 August 1944. He was flying on the Munster-Handorf mission with the crew of Lt. Neil Rosener. He was captured and sat

the balance of the war as a prisoner. After the war he attended the University of Oklahoma, graduating in 1950. He continued photography as a free lance commercial photographer, later entering Federal service. Shortly before his death he had transferred to the Aeronautical Center at Tinker AFB.

During the years, he continued as a free lancer, being a member of the Free Lance Association, and a Patron and Friend of Oklahoma Artists.

Along with TSgt C.K. Browning and Sgt Frank Creegan, Cliff formed a troika of 550th combat photographers that will long be remembered.

He was buried at Rose Hill Cemetery in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on 11 December 1979. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Clifford J. Peek Jr., his mother, Mrs. Clifford J. Peek Sr., and a sister, Mrs. S.D. Hardin Sr. Hardin Sr.

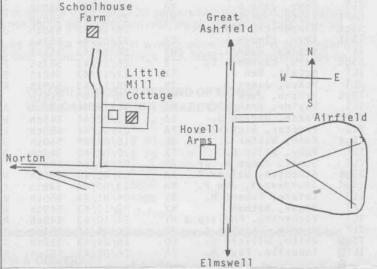

I will naturally return any material you can provide me with. The house in the sketch.

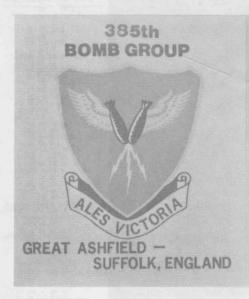

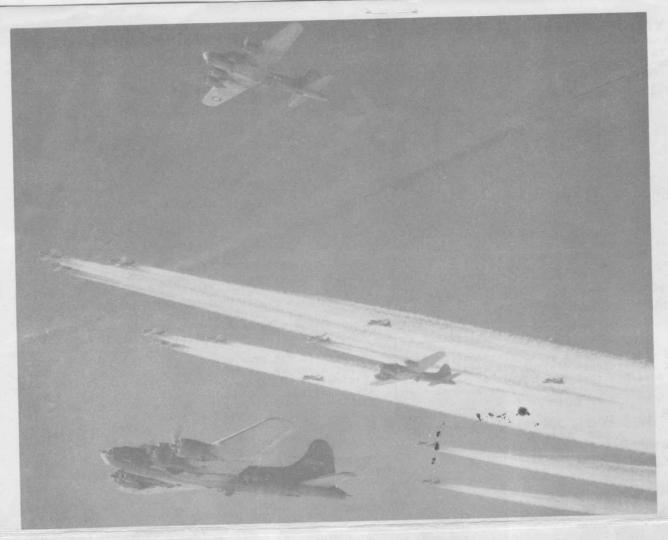
